



In the Koka era (1844-1847) Shokichi, a chock maker living 'at Matal near Osaka constructed a small watch which could be worn as a ring. This small but excellent piece of clock-manufacture is owned by the Nishi Honganji, a temple of the Shin sect in Kyoto. In the 3rd year of Knel (1850) a "miannen-dokel" or "myriad-year clock" was completed by Tanaka Giemon in Kyoto. This clock standing less than two feet high, functions for a period of four hundred day at one winding. "Eto" (sexagenary cycle), Japan time, European time, 24 seasons of the old Chinese calendar, the days of the week, and the age of the moon are respectively designated on the six dial plates of this unique clock.
