MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

Report On The Monitoring Of Kodansha Phones

: Lt. T. Kawano

: Chief, PPS Division

- 1. Monitoring of Kodensha lines (33-0130, 0136, 0180 and 3982) were initiated on the 18th of May 1948 by Lt. Kawano and Mr. Mashita.
- 2. After monitoring for a reasonable length of time, it was observed that line 33-3982 was not productive, and that lines 33-0130. 0180 and 0136 were switchboards in Kodensha Building handling telephone traffic for Aska Co., Bungeika Kyokai (Literary Men's Association), Kobunsha, Toyokuni Insatsu and the various departments of Kodansha.
- 3. Since no materials of informational value could be obtained by monitoring of the above lines, monitoring of lines 33-0130, 33-0136 and 33-3982 were discontinued and three new Kodansha lines (33-0131. 0186, and 0189) were installed.
- 4. Lines 33-0131, 0186 and 0189 were also observed to be switchboards in Kodansha Building handling phone calls to and from the building.
- 5. Outside of personal and business calls, no conversations of informational value were intercented so monitoring of all Kodansha lines were discontinued as of 17 June 1748.
 - 6. However, after reviewing ir. meshita's daily report, TaraHasili whose phone number is 85-2562 could be the individual whose books NARA of the Foreign Office tried to have Kodansha publish.
 - 7. Therefore, recommend non security monitoring of line 85-2562 for a reasonable period of time.

Jucao Jamano 2nd Lt., Infantry

Majority of the telephone traffic to and from the Foreign Office (57-0862) consist of personal calls, requests for information, susticious transactions, routine office matters, and other minor subjects. However, several conversations indicate that favoritism exists when informationss and advanced copies of news such as addresses by the prime minister are disseminated to the Nippon Times by the Foreign Office in advance of other newspapers. It may be presumed that this is due to the intimate relation between the Foreign Office and the Nippon Times. It has been also observed that a certain individual of the Foreign Office (Nara) by utilizing his position and connections is acting as a go between to have books of certain individuals (Takahashi Sensei, KOSEK; Sensei) published.

1. Attached is draft of check note From: G-2 To: CIAE, notifying Civil Information and Education Section that investigation of possible infringements upon freedom of press by the Japanese Government has been closed, and forwarding latest available information on that subject.

- 2. Original request for information on possible violation of press freedom was made by CLAE in a check note to 3-2, subj: Surveillance of Press Messages, dated 9 December 1947, to which a reply was forwarded by G-2 in check note No. 2, dated 8 January 1948.
- 3. To obtain additional information on possible violation of CIS originated SCIPIN's prohibiting interference by the Japanese Government in freedom of the press, certain personnel in the Office of Public Relations, Foreign Office, were wat in-listed, as stated in Memo For Record to check note No. 2 referred to above, from 7 January 1948 to 28 May 1948.
- 4. Information made available through watch-listing of Office of Public Relations, Foreign Office, indicates that this agency of the Japanese Government has frequent contact with Yippon Times, and some other publishing firms, but does not establish that these contacts would constitute violations of SCIP prohibitions on freedom of press in Japan.



Per direction of ivil Censorship Officer, conferred with Kaoru HAYASHI, Chief, Office of Public Relations, Foreign Office, on source of material being used in restricted publication compiled and published by Mr. Hayashi's office, entitled "Weekly Report of World Public Opinion on Japan" (Sekai Tai-Nichi Yoron Shuho).
- 2. It was pointed out to Mr. Havashi that publication sometimes contained material from so rees other than that which Foreign Office had contracts to obtain news, according to information given CCD, CIS, G-2, by Office of Public Relations, Foreign Office.
- 3. Mr. Hayashi stated that perhaps information previous given had failed to include all the foreign and Japanese news services from which the Foreign Office was guying copy.
- 4. He added that he would have a list of all agencies from which roreign Office buys news sent to this office. On the following day, 14 Aug, list was brought by Yasuhiko NARA, also of Office of Public Relations, Foreign Office. (Incl. #1)
- 5. Mr. Hayashi was asked if the Foreign Office had ever been able to get a license to operate its monitoring post at No. 1, 450, Kamiyama, Kurume-mura, Kitatama-gun, Tokyo, which they had operated up until 14 Dec 47.
- 6. Mr. Hayashi said no license had been obtained and the monitoring post had been taken over by a American Air force installation, he believed, as a weather station, in April 1948.

1. The subject of whether Japanese Government is violating SCAPIN's directing that the Japanese Government exercise no control over the Japanese Press became a surveillance project for CCD as a result of attached correspondence originating with CIAE (Incl. #1).

2. Telephone watch-listing of the Public Relations Bivision, Foreign Office was initiated in 7 January 1948. This turned out to be a very interesting.x It showed that personnel in the Public Relations Bivisian were assisting the Hippon Times, and were in contact with other publication houses, such as Kedansha. Mousear, with the exception of a few cases, this assistance seemed to fall under favoritism, rather or requests for favore (in the case of Kolansha), rather than controls.

3. Most of the conversations were obviously very guarded, and second parties were very difficult to identify.

4. In addition, the monitored intercepts showed that personnel, using the Fublic Relations Division telephone, identified themselves as being in the Intelligence Dursau, though efforts to find out the functions or existence of that bureau on published outlines of Japanese Governmental offices were to no avail.



- 1. This is initial report on "Tokyo Tsushin" requested by GIS IX. Omeck Note No. 1. There has been no delay in initiation of this investigation, which maximum makes is being pursued circumspectly because of status of Japanese possibly involved.
- 2. It is not yet known if "Tokyo Tsushin" has originated by the Division of Public Relations of the Japanese Ministry of Foreing Affairs, but keyveresunelverktheiverfrage through watch-listing of key personnel of that office it is hope believed that private vidence for or against that hypothesis willbe produced.
- 3. Information on the existence and operations of Japanese Foreign Office monitoring post was furnished by Latsuzo OMUNURA, formerly Director of Division of Public Relations, Foreign Office, on 15 April 47.
- 4. Mr. Okumura was questioned after Givil Comporation Detachment intercepted in the mails a copy of confidential publication, "Weekly Reporting" World Public Opinion on Japan Sekai Tai-nichi Toron Shuho.
- 5. Since then CIS has obtained copies of all tames of this publication for scruting by CCD, beginning with issue of 2 Jan 37 and continuing to date.
- 6. There has been no information discovered yet which would indicate that the Foreign Office is using information obtained by monitoring to thankerees on civil liberties.
- 7. Information that monitoring post had suspended operations on 14 Dec 47 was given by Kaoru HAYASHI, Chief of Archives Section, Zoreign Office, which was responsible for actual operation of the station.
- 8. Information that decision to suspend operations had been made in any a because Foreign Office heard that American correspondents had gotten wind of its operations was furnished by Akira MATSUI, Akting Chief, Division of Public Relations. Foreign Office: Mr. Matsui added that the decision was made by the "Vice-Minister, A yersumably Tice-Minister Katsuo OKAZAXI.
- 9. Despite previous ascertion by Mr. OXUMURA in April 47 that a complete report on this monitoring station was furnished Civil Communication Section on 12 Dec. 45, and operations of the station licensed by CCS, no license has yet been obtained, according to Mr. Hayashi.
- 10. Steps to obtain such a license have been initiated by the Foreign Office, according to Mr. Hayashi, and pendling an receipt, a license has been given by the Japanese Ministry of Communication. A copy of this Wlicenses has have furnished by Mr. Hayashi.
- Il. Surveillance of this Foreign Office activity is continuing. Activ Mr. MATSUI has been placed on security watch-list, and other key personnel of his office are watch-listed as the information necessary for watch-listing is obtained.

PIUMPIANG, NORTH KORRA (Atrmail)

I have just spent four days in a health resert on the east coast where I went swimming three times a day on one of the finest beaches in the world. Have unter, smooth, guidly-disping sand, all the advantages of a tropical beach with mose of the dangerous cos-plikts or animals. Two years ago this beach and the village along the belonged to the fuling Japanese. Today they belong to the Department of Labour and are used by the workers' social insurance schemes.

Pive shy but self-possessed were come to my room when I saind for an interview of the sense vertexes. There were two weavers from Ennhang Textile Vertex, a young worker from the silk filature mill of Pyungyang, and a fifteen-year-old orphan - she looked like a ten-year-old child - who lives in a factory dermitory and works six hours a day and goes two hours to the factory school. But chiefly I remember a woman of 36, who sat desurely looking at the ocean, in a figured white silk gova.

She looked a typical homewife and I perspend interviewing her, thinking her the wife of some successful engineer. I got a shock when I put my first question to her. She was a skilled miner in the gald mines, working three hundred feet underground.

"Isn't that heavy work," I saked her.

She smiled a bit spolegatically and said it was. "But it isn't as heavy as it used to be," she said. "Under the Japanese I leaded admined pushed the ears. I verked thirteen hours and more per day. Now I am a skilled driller, with a passuatic drill. I work seven hours and I get very good pay.

Lee Mai Rea was her name. She had werked many years in the mines. Only one year has she been a driller, for under the Japanese, women were not allowed to learn the higher skills. She is proud of her job. The gold mine where she works has 206 wemen among its 2,500 werkers, but only two of the women are drillers. Lee Mai Rea was the first.

Loo's husband works for the same mine, but he works on the surface. He charpens drills. As for wages, the husband gets at next two thousand you a month.

"But I made four thousand you last menth," bragged Lee. "Wenn new get equal pay for equal work, and my work is very skilled. Formerly, the driller did one
